## TUNBRIDGE WELLS MODEL UNITED NATIONS GENERAL ASSEMBLY 2016 DRAFT RESOLUTION ON REFUGEES AND HUMAN RIGHTS

## The General Assembly of the United Nations

- 1. Recalling Article 14 of The Universal Declaration of Human Rights, the 1990 International
- 2. Convention on the Protection of the Rights of All Migrant Workers and Members of Their
- 3. Families, and the 1951 Refugee Convention and the 1967 protocol,
- 4. Recognising the work of UNHCR, ILO and UNCHR in protecting the rights of migrants,
- 5. <u>Noting with concern</u> the causes of people becoming migrants: internal conflict and denial of
- 6. human rights in certain Member States; the actions of terrorist groups such as the so-called
- 7. Islamic State; the widening gap in economic development between richer and poorer Member
- 8. States; and the effects of climate change,
- 9. <u>Concerned also</u> at the significant demands made upon some less economically-developed
- 10. Member States by current patterns of migration,
- 11. <u>Noting</u> that military intervention and the support of repressive regimes by certain Member
- 12. States is partly responsible for people becoming migrants.
- 13. <u>Noting</u> that when there is internal conflict within a Member State most of the migrants created
- 14. by such conflict are internal or in neighbouring states,
- 15. Acknowledging the important contribution provided by migrants to development,
- 16. Welcoming the significant contribution of Member States such as Greece, Turkey, Italy and
- 17. Malta to dealing with the migrant crisis in the Mediterranean area,
- 18. Appalled at reports of migrants arriving in Egypt being murdered for their body parts,
- 19. <u>Welcoming</u> the decision of the International Organisation for Migration (IOM) to join the
- 20. United Nations as a related organisation, and China's decision to join the IOM,
- 21. Recognising the principle established under international law that all states have the sovereign
- 22. right to control admission to their territory and to regulate the admission and expulsion of
- 23. foreign nationals.
- **24.** Recognising the importance of the Secretary General's May 2016 report 'In Safety and Dignity:
- 25. Addressing Large Movements of Refugees and Migrants'
- 26. Concerned at the implications of millions of children out of school and millions of adults
- 27. having no possibilities for earning an income for meeting the MDGs

## Calls upon all Member States to

- 29. <u>Set budgets to meet</u> the target of 0.7% of GDP for aid in order to promote economic and
- 30. political stability and to meet the Millennium Development Goals within States currently
- 31. experiencing net migration.
- 32. Establish a conference to agree changes to international law in order to recognise the
- 33. existence of climate and environmental refugees,
- 34. <u>Take steps to</u> address the challenge of undocumented or irregular migration to foster a
- 35. secure, regular and orderly process of migration, and to ensure that all such requests are dealt
- 36. with within 18 months, in accordance with their relevant international obligations and
- 37. commitments,
- 38. Allow at all times free and unlimited access to all facilities used for the detention or
- 39. containment of migrants to officials appointed by UNCHR or UNHCR,
- 40. <u>Provide</u> safe havens for refugees and asylum seekers, based on a quota system calculated on per
- 41. capita income,
- 42. Provide material support, through the UNHCR, for those countries most affected by migration
- 43. from countries affected by conflict,
- 44. <u>Cease</u> the detention of people, particularly children, seeking asylum,
- 45. Refrain from inflammatory statements regarding migrants, and to prosecute citizens found
- 46. guilty of racist and xenophobic statements and actions.
